

Co-operation for Health and Education Programmes (CHEPs): Famine Relief Programme for Kenya, 2011

We wish to thank the well wishers for their intention to get aid to the poor and needy human beings suffering from starvation in the drought/famine affected regions of Kenya. Upto 5m men, women and children are going hungry in Kenya alone. Over the past seven weeks, the CHEPs team of volunteers distributed food to Coast, Eastern, Rift and mainly Northeastern province- the most hard hit by the drought. We wish to thank you for sponsoring food aid to them. The food items were distributed by us personally among the most needy. We managed to reach over 11,666 households (89,929 individuals) in 37 villages and refugee camps. Currently many organisations and individuals are sending food aid to Northeastern province of Kenya for the refugees from Somalia and, to a much lesser extent, Kenyans living in areas bordering Somalia. These people are also of the same Somali race, same culture, all Muslims, and suffering from extreme lack of food and water. The population of the area were mainly dependent upon their livestock-goats, cows, camels. Due to the drought, most of these animals died leaving the people completely destitute. Moreover, the area is grossly under-developed and most people are extremely poor leading to weak coping mechanisms. There's very little support for them to stand on their own feet and come out of the current disaster. CHEPs is planning a long term programme of development projects in the region include water and sanitation, education, agriculture, business diversification with women's empowerment. We hope you'll continue to support this cause.
